

As we celebrate the solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, many of the traditional hymns and images for the day are joyful and triumphal. In Ezekiel, we see God as both the tender, loving shepherd and the one who will judge at the Sec-



ond Coming. This ties in with Matthew's Gospel and separation of sheep and goats and "whatsoever you do." We pray Psalm 23 with great familiarity and hope. First Corinthians carefully explains to us the order in which all will happen.

OLD IDEA, RECENT ADDITION

Perhaps it is important to remember that while the image of Christ as King has been known throughout Christianity, this feast was founded in 1925 as a reaction and a response to growing secularism, communism, and atheism that were becoming prevalent after World War I. If we pull back the lens even further, we will remember that throughout history there has seldom been a peaceful time in the Christian world. The Holy Land itself has frequently been a battle ground. Nor has church leadership always had clean hands, and there have been wars, genocides, and insurrections "in the name of Christ." Today, when more and more people are leaving organized religion altogether, and people identify themselves as "spiritual but not religious" or "nones," the need for Christ as leader and ruler and guide is more pressing than ever.

INHERIT THE KINGDOM

The world in which we live is complex. Yet when we focus on the Gospel story, it seems very simple indeed. We do not have to know it all or figure it all out. We are not the one on the throne during the Last Judgment. When God starts separating the sheep from the goats, the formula is a simple rule of thumb. "When did you see Christ in others? When did you respond accordingly?" It does not ask if you are Catholic or even Christian; whether you had a police record or an incurable disease; whether you had a PhD or a fifth-grade education, or what languages you spoke. The call is to remember that "Whatsoever you did to the least you did for me." And then there will be the invitation, "Come you who are blessed. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD

Advent, the beginning of our ecclesiastical year, starts next Sunday, November 29, the fourth Sunday before Christmas. The advent wreath is a popular devotional aid that symbolizes the light of God coming into the world through the birth of His Son.

Traditionally, the wreath is made with four candles, three purple and one rose, embedded in a circle of evergreens. The circle is a symbol of God's eternity and endless mercy that has no beginning or end. The purple candles represent hope, peace and love while

the rose symbolizes that Christmas is near and we should rejoice. In the wreath ceremony at Church, a purple candle is lit on the First Sunday of Advent. On the second Sunday, an additional purple candle is lit, and on the third Sunday, the rose candle is added. On the fourth Sunday all four candles are lighted.

In the home, the wreath is usually placed on the dining table and lit daily before the evening meal or anytime the family is all together. The lighting follows the same sequence as in Church. Children particularly enjoy this meaningful Christmas tradition if they are involved in planning the prayers and scripture readings that

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

Mon, Nov 23: St. Clement I, Pope, Martyr; St. Columban, Abbot, Blessed Miguel Augustín Pro, Priest & Martyr (USA).

Clement I, died c.100 under Trajan; fourth bishop of Rome; wrote famous epistle to the Corinthians.

Columban, or Columbanus, died 615; Irish monk and missionary to France; wrote a strict monastic rule and Penitential; founded monasteries at Luxeuil, Bobbio and elsewhere; exiled to Italy for denouncing court immorality and lax bishops; died at Bobbio.

Blessed Miguel Agustín Pro: Graham Greene's classic The Power and the Glory immortalized Mexico's persecuted Church of the 1920s. But photographs of Father Pro—arms outstretched to image Christ Crucified, kneeling in prayer before the firing squad, crumpled dead on the groundvividly, visually remind us that not long ago, not far away, the faith we take for granted cost everything! Born to a mining family, Miguel became a Jesuit and was sent to study Catholic labor movements in Belgium in preparation for evangelizing Mexico's workers. But he returned to find a Mexico determined to annihilate Catholicism, and, like priests before him during Roman persecutions, England's Reformation, and in China today, ministered secretly to an "underground Church" until apprehended and sentenced to the firing squad. In his final moments, Father Pro blessed his executioners, forgave his enemies, and shouted: "Viva el Cristo Rey!-Long Live Christ the King!"—his defiant, dying proclamation of ultimate, transcendent loyalty. Father Pro's martyrdom reinvigorated that beleaguered Church, whose countless faithful, never again afraid, would throng John Paul II when he visited Pro's beloved Mexico fifty-two years later. Tues, Nov 24: St. Andrew Dung-Lac, Priest, Martyr, and Companions, Martyrs.

During the 17th-19th centuries in Vietnam, some 130,000 Christians suffered cruel martyrdom, many by decapitation or strangulation; today 117, most of them killed during the reigns of Emperors Minh-Mang (1820-1840) and Tu-Duc (1847-1883) are remembered; they include 11 Spanish Dominicans, 10 members of the Society of Foreign Missions of Paris, and 96 Vietnamese (37 priests, including Andrew Dung-Lac, died 1839), and 59 laypersons, including one seminarian and ten Dominican Tertiaries; all canonized 19 June 1988 by Pope John Paul II.

Wed, Nov 25: St. Catherine of Alexandria, Virgin, Martyr.

Catherine was a learned woman of the early fourth century who, according to legend, following her conversion at the age of eighteen, preached the Gospel throughout Alexandria in Egypt. While imprisoned by the emperor Maximus, she converted both the empress and the leader of the armed forces and for this she was martyred. Legend has that upon her death, after a wheel of torture (known as "Catherine's wheel") broke, her body was carried by angels to Mt. Sinai. St. Joan of Arc was thought to have heard her voice. Venerated in the East since the 9th c., she is a patron saint of philosophers, preachers, librarians, and young unmarried women.
